Rabbi's Words



Over 60 days! If you're reading this on August 1st, we are more than 65 days away from the new year, Rosh Hashanah. It's a weird thing about the holidays. When talking about when the Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur fell on any given years, most of us will say that they're either "late" or "early" this year. Have you ever noticed that we never say the holidays are on time? Maybe it's because we're completely comfortable with what the holidays mean.

As I sit here in July, trying to write an article for August, I'm reminded of a Staples television commercial that ran for years. In it, a middle-aged man danced through the aisles of a store to the lyrics, "it's the most wonderful time of the year." Dragging behind him were sad looking children whose depression was only worsened by their father's happiness. The announcer then came on to declare, "that's right, they're going back to school!"

For many of us, it's an exciting time, a time of transition and expectation, a time of anxiety and anticipation. The new school year is beginning, and the Jewish year is ending. While you've no doubt read it before, this is a time for us to sit back and to take stock of our lives.

While the calendars for the rest of the world won't change for a few more months, many of us are feeling some sort of beginning. Students are getting ready to go back to school, buying their binders and back to school clothes. For some of us, it's a natural time to reflect on where we were a year ago and all that has transpired in the last 12 months or so since last Yom Kippur.

There is simply too much that has happened to us as a Jewish people over that last year to properly delve into in a bulletin article. Instead, I want to invite you to take a moment and reflect on what has changed for you. Are you where you wanted to be a year ago? Are you where you thought you'd be? If the answer to one or both of those questions is no, then it might be worth exploring why our lives are something other than we'd want for ourselves.

When I was a student, I dreaded the fall. I loved the freedom and undemanding days of summer and was always reluctant to let them give way to the structure and stricture of the school year. Even as a parent, I don't relish my children going back to school. I don't get excited about getting them up and to school on time, of all the practices and rehearsals, the meetings, and the parties to which they'll be invited.

In many ways, it's a stressful time of the year. But for me, personally, there is one way in which this is the "most wonderful time of the year." I love the High Holy Days. I love the obligation we feel to take stock of ourselves and our lives. I look forward to the difficult task of introspection that is demanded of us during these holidays.

May it be a year of blessing and happiness for us all.

IT'S APPLES AND HONEY TIME!

The practice of eating apples and honey on Rosh Hashanah dates back centuries. Apples, often considered one of the most popular fruits in many cultures, have come to symbolize the *Shechinah*, or Divine Presence, in Kabbalistic thought. Honey, with its enduring sweetness, represents our prayer for a year filled with joy and blessings. Together, they encapsulate our collective wish for a sweet new year, filled with health and happiness.

Rabbi Shimon Apisdorf explains that an apple tree grows differently than other fruit trees. "On most fruit trees the leaves appear before the fruit, thus providing a protective cover for the young fruit," he writes. "The apple, however, makes a preemptive move by appearing before the leaves. The Jewish people are compared to an apple because we are willing to live out our Jewish lives even if this seems to leave us unprotected." Rabbi Apisdorf also suggests dipping apples in honey represents a symbolic bee analogy. "A bee can inflict pain by its sting, yet it also produces delicious honey," he writes. "Life has this same duality of potential. We pray that our choices will result in a sweet year."

During the Rosh Hashanah meal, it is customary to recite a special blessing over the apples and honey. This act not only expresses our desire for a good year but also serves as a reminder of the importance of gratitude and positivity as we enter a new chapter.

Congregation Am HaYam is again helping you by providing an opportunity to wish others "*L'shanah Tovah*" ("For a good year") with a gift basket containing apples, honey, and other goodies. Not only will you be able to send your token of friendship, but you will be participating in the tradition of dipping apples in honey to begin the year with sweet wishes and hopes. Each recipient will receive the goodies along with the blessings associated with the home ritual, enabling them, with family and friends, to express their joy in and hope for the New Year. Each will receive one basket with all the names of those who purchased it attached. A short explanation will also be included. If you are putting newspapers, magazines, shredded mail, frozen meal containers and glass in your bin for the city to pick up that is great. **If you are still putting in soda cans and water bottles, please consider saving them for CAH.**

Soda cans are recyclable. Plastic water bottles, both plain and flavored can be recycled. From the small 4 ounce to the large half gallon bottles can bring money in to CAH.

If you think a few cents doesn't matter, I can tell you a small income on a regular basis adds up. Since we started in 2014 CAH has earned \$ 1,173.32. You can bring the recycles to services or you can save them in 13 or 33 gallon bags and I will be happy to pick them up.

There are lots of holiday parties coming up between now and New Years Eve. You might ask neighbors to save them.

Updated CAH Protocols for Services

(Revised, June 2024)

Now that the Omicron surge has waned, we are ready to remove some of the protocols that have been in place.

1. Everyone must be fully vaccinated to come to services and events held in our CAH home. Proof of vaccination should be shown the first time entering.
2. Social distancing will be maintained. All rows can be utilized.
3. Wearing masks is optional (as all are fully vaccinated).
4. For those who cannot attend services, we will continue live-streaming our services.
5. **Those having aliyot and honors may again do so from Bimah. We will maintain the music stand in front of the Bimah for those who would prefer to do their honor from there due to distancing or mobility issues.**

Best Practices/Etiquette Upon Moving Back

Not everyone is equally comfortable with touch at this time, whether it is a handshake, a hug, or a Shabbat shalom kiss. We can express our joy in seeing each other without these, but if it's something any of us want to do, please ASK the person you are about to greet in a physical way first. Please do not take anyone's "NO" as a rejection. Please support everyone in the comfort level in which they find themselves.

ORDERING MEMORIAL WALL PLAQUES AT CAH

Jewish tradition sees memory as a sacred act, allowing us to be inspired by the good in a loved one's life and live more fully in our own days. A yahrzeit plaque allows for a permanent remembrance of a loved one, ensuring that his or her name will be recalled in perpetuity in our congregation. It is very meaningful to see the memorial plaque of your loved one on the High Holy Days, especially at the Yom Kippur Yizkor (Remembrance) service, on the Shabbat close to the yahrzeit, and at other special moments (including Passover, Shavuot and Sukkot Yizkor services).

Names on the plaque are automatically recalled publicly at the Shabbat prior to the yahrzeit at both our Friday night and Saturday morning services just before Mourner's Kaddish.

Ordering a plaque is a wonderful way to pay tribute to that special person or persons of blessed memory.

The current cost of ordering a bronze plaque for the memorial wall is \$360.00 per plaque. If you would like to order two plaques now, the cost will be \$330.00 per name. For 3 or more plaques the cost is \$300.00 per name.

Thank you for considering doing this for your loved ones. Their lives will be remembered and an inspiration to many.
